What has been happening this term?

Mr Lewis attended and gave some words of praise and encouragement. The end of year reports provide a final opportunity for students to attend such an event.

Year 7 Bikeability

The Level 3 Bikeability course was offered to all students in Year 7 in mid-January. It is run by the Council to encourage the safe use of bikes across York. Many students completed the Level 1 and 2 at Primary school and this was a chance to increase their knowledge of the road by completing the next level. It was great to see over 60 Year 7 students wanting to take part to develop new skills by taking this fantastic opportunity. The training has commenced and is taking place during school time for a number of weeks. It is being led by qualified trainers who take the students out either in pairs or individually. The feedback from students has been excellent and they have really enjoyed the course. Maisie Booth was one of these students and wrote the following: 'I wanted to do Bikeability because I enjoyed it at primary school. It was interesting doing Level 3, we learned how to cross junctions, ride on major roads and use different positions on the road. I would recommend it to anyone who goes on their bike often like me'.



Year 7 STEM Trip

Forty Year 7 students went on a trip to the National STEM Centre in January aiming to learn more about STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) and associated careers. The event was a live stage show specially designed to inspire children from a wide diversity of backgrounds to consider STEM careers. It was hosted by the BBC presenter and scientist Fran Scott. The show took students on an interactive journey as they investigated the world of STEM and learn about modern role models from a wide diversity of backgrounds and their contributions to science and engineering. There were live experiments and thought-provoking activities to empower young people of all backgrounds to have the confidence to set future goals and pursue their dreams.

Numeracy Challenge

Following on from the literacy assembly that Year 7 students had before Christmas, students were given an assembly on the importance of numeracy across the curriculum. It was stressed that numeracy is not just essential in maths lessons but across all subjects. As a way of recognising this students were set a numeracy challenge. They had to estimate the mean number of panini's sold in the canteen each week for the past ten weeks. A £30 Amazon gift voucher was given to the winner, followed by a £20 and £10 for the second and third place respectively. The winner was Ffion Lloyd with Daniel Sutherland and Daisy Glover coming second and third. The mean average estimate was 846 which was about 100 too high of the actual mean which was 746. Thank you to Mr Hickling who coordinated the challenge.



Girls Football

It has been an extremely busy time for the Year 7 girls football team. They have been competing all over Yorkshire and against other schools in many different fixtures in the last few weeks. In the days before we broke up for Christmas they competed in 5 aside tournament. In the first match they comfortably beat Tadcaster 6-0 before thrashing Manor 8-0! The final group match was a 2-1 win against Archbishop's Holgate. In the final the girls showed tremendous grit and determination to draw 2-2 against Huntington. The match went into extra time but no one could find a winner. Eventually the girls scored a golden goal to come out victorious! A superb victory and an excellent end to the term.



On the 15th of January, the Year 7 girls football team played in Round 3 of the U12's PlayStation Cup at Malet Lambert School in Hull. In the second half, the girls went straight onto the pitch with a positive attitude, communicated a lot better and as always, showed great skill on the ball. 






Geography

Drama and Music


