A lot of schools have had to only provide grab bags of food, but we have been able to continue to provide a free choice, hot meal throughout the term.

Cleanliness is obviously paramount at all times for us as caterers, but we have ramped it up even more during our return to school. Each year group has separate equipment on trolleys and the students have been great at clearing away after themselves. My team are incredible at cleaning between sittings—they have got the system down to a fine art!
