A massive congratulations to Misham Mumtahina in 7SN who was the weekly winner of the National Design Ventura Online Design Competition. Design Ventura challenges students in secondary schools to design products for the Design Museum shop. It is an opportunity for students to develop design thinking, creative and business capabilities, and employability skills. There were over 3,000 entries to the competition which demonstrates what an achievement it is to be chosen.


Some students have gone the extra mile during lockdown and have made Fulford School proud:

The "Stars" notice board is looking very healthy with every one of you now represented in there, well done for this achievement.









Computing


Holly and Kiri in Year 9 would like to thank everyone who responded to their survey with ideas, suggestions and feedback for their mental health for teenagers app.
