


Year 7 Progress report: A brand new start a new school, new routines—wow! What a start the new year 7s have had.



YEAR 9 Mr P Gatenby







This year we have welcomed 153 Y12 into the sixth form and two new form tutors: Mr Kel and Miss Riordan. The first term has been

very busy and being back in school full-time - uninterrupted by lockdowns - has brough with it both opportunities and challenges, as students have managed new routines and physical tiredness. We have had fun by dressing up for Halloween and raising fund for Breast Cancer Day. Both Y12 and Y13 have made a fantastic start to the year.



For Y12 the fun started with the Induction Day, designed to help students get to know the structures, staff and make new friends. Later we also had the fabulous opportunity to take the year group to Flamingo Land and all had fun in the glorious autumn sunshine. Back in school, students have been applying themselves in lessons, developing key organisation and independence skills. Earlier in the term, to support students with this, the Learning Performance company delivered a workshop on how to develop good study skills and this was also shared with parents during our Information

Evening. Students have also been developing their interests through the wide Enrichment programme. With lots of different opportunities on offer, Wednesday period 5 has been full of great activity. From debate and card club to the sixth form committee and Core Maths, there are so many opportunities on offer. And students have also opportunity to turn these

experiences into accreditation, not just through the internal HEART award but also by becoming a World Class Student. The term has finished off with students preparing for their work experience during the Alternative Curriculum day which will take place in July.

All personal statements will need to be completed by the end of November.

Students have also been taking part in various other exciting activities, from the Geography Blencathra trip to First Aid training, it has been wonderful seeing our students enjoy such a variety of activities that have been missing over the last year.

All the students have settled in really well this half term, new students have done amazingly and other students who have changed years and key stages have also done a brilliant job. Well done every one, am very proud of you all!



Fulford Take Uniform to Africa and Beyond

A huge thank you to everyone that has donated old uniform and football equipment this half term. We were inundated with so much uniform that we have been able to support more than just the original

Wing Commander Neil Hope MBE collected over 2700 items of clothing and football equipment. It won't be going to just Kenya, they donate to 58 countries around the world. The uniform and equipment will go to a number of schools, orphanages and will also be handed out in the slums in Nairobi.

In February we will receive photographs of our uniform being used and worn in Africa. We are looking to develop the link between us and the schools involved in the project for future work and endless possibilities of collaboration.
