Lesson insight - Science

Over in the science labs, Year 8 have been studying a small topic on the respiratory system and made these impressive model lungs to demonstrate their understanding of anatomical structures of the respiratory system. They could then evaluate the pros and cons of the model as a way to explain how humans breathe. This visual representation of the respiratory process engaged students and helped them to recall key anatomical information.






Alternative Curriculum Day

Students completed Computer Science tasks and took part in an Escape Room whilst in school. Students also then took a walk in to York city centre to learn about the rich Viking history, noting the impact building of the bridges throughout the city had in the city. They sketched and learned about Skeldergate Bridge, Millennium Bridge and Rowntree Bridge This also tied into to physics and DT in terms of the materials and structures used to ensure the stability of the bridge.

This was the first opportunity students have had to go on a trip off site due to Covid 19, and they represented Fulford School excellently.
