Our students have been give lots of support on the run up to exams after Easter. We focused on getting the balance right between being prepared and making sure you get a break. Here are some of the top tips we shared with students - these are vital for every day learning, not just for exam periods:

- Make a realistic timetable or a plan for your learning and revision
- Use mind maps to link ideas and then condense them onto flash cards
- Build in some downtime to relax / see friends / play sport or exercise / watch a movie
- Add some variety listen to a podcast or watch a video
- Eat healthily
- Practise, practise, practise do past paper questions so you know what to expect
- Do your revision in chunks and take breaks (move around take a walk)
- Sleep prioritise getting 7 to 9 hours a night
- Set yourself mini-goals and tick them off when you achieve them
- One step at a time . . . don't STRESS!

#### **Computing Extra Curricular News**

Thank you and well done to all student who've got involved in computing clubs and competitions this half term.

It was great to relaunch STEM club with a brilliant group of Y7-Y9 students to work through Lego robotics challenges and submit a working prototype of a solar panel that always points towards the sun to the PA Consulting Raspberry Pi competition. Y11 iMedia students also entered the older age group category for the same competition with their ingenious working project that senses water pollution levels and can be used to prevent water companies getting away with leaking raw sewage into rivers. We plan to relaunch STEM club with a new group of students after Easter – there was a long waiting list for places so it'll be great for more students to have a go at the Lego robotics challenges.



Students at Game Development Club have learnt how to create 2d and 3d games using PyGameZero and Unity and we hope to relaunch the club for new members to join in a game development competition using scratch. Look out for updates on ClassCharts for how to join in.

The Fulford School Ultimate Frisbee team attended the Under 17 Indoor national championships in March. The team had a fantastic weekend on and off the pitch and came away with an impressive fourth-place finish. They have been working so hard since the start of the school year, training twice per week after school and dedicating many hours to the team, and it's so impressive to see the improvements they are all making.

To add to the news about the tournament, we are also delighted to announce that nine members of the team have been selected to represent Great Britain in August at the World Junior Ultimate Championships. The players will travel to Poland and compete against teams from the rest of the world. This is an amazing achievement for these students, who work so hard for themselves and for the team.

## **SCIENCE: FARADY CHALLENGE**

On Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> April, twelve year 8 students set off to the STEM centre at York University, supported by two of the science technician team, with the aim of competing in a Faraday challenge. We arrived to find we were up against three other local schools: Manor, All Saints and York High.

Our 12 students split into two teams, one of all girls and the other all boys. Then the challenge was set, to use all of their Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Maths skills to develop a prototype that would improve the stay of young patients and their families while in hospital. They could build anything they wanted to but there was one proviso: there had to be an electronic circuit involved.

Each team had a limited number of Faraday currency to buy the materials they would need. The girls decided on a wheel chair designed especially for children, something vibrantly coloured with lights and sound in incorporated. The boys opted for an electrically operated bedside table to for used as and when the patient wanted it. The brightly coloured table included a cup holder, was made from sustainable materials and powered by solar energy. When all the teams had completed the challenge, their ideas were presented to the group and judged by Mick, the activity leader. Fulford boys team won the trophy and hope to be asked to go forward to the National finals in Liverpool later in the year.



## **SCIENCE: COMPETITION**

We ran a Science Week competition on the theme of 'Growth.' Students were invited to interpret this in any way they wanted and make a poster. Anna Mogyorosy (year 7) produced these incredible images below. As you can see, she has taken some beautiful photos of flowering camellia and the pollen close up.

Name: Hannah Rogers

Job title: Head of New Business and Client Lead, Blue Yonder Research My journey: English Literature was always my passion; I loved it! I loved to learn about what lay beyond the text – the socio-historic context, the philosophy, the politics...but more than anything, I just loved a good story.



After A-Level English, I went to Newcastle University to study English Literature where I discovered a love of Medieval English Literature. It taught me that, tech has changed, fashion has changed, sensibilities have changed, but, fundamentally, people haven't changed in thousands of years. After graduating, I made a summer dash to the Arctic Circle, sailed the Bay of Biscay, backpacked across Europe, worked in my village shop...and then started my Masters Degree In Medieval English Literature. I wanted to be a professor, and set my heart of completing a doctorate....but I didn't. I graduated, but realised I wanted to live in the real world and look to the future, and so I applied for a job at 'Blue Yonder Research' – a tiny business with big ambitions. 14 years on, I worked my way up from graduate to Director and beyond... and we've turned our small, Leeds based company into a globally recognised, multi million pound company.

#### Top tips for students:

- 'Life begins at the end of your comfort zone': how do you know what you are capable of achieving until you try? Try something, multiple times if you have to. Fail. Learn from it. Grow.
- Be kind.
