

### "...great to see the camaraderie shown..."





Lydia Cornforth, Charlotte Stevens and Alice Haxby and Bel-


la Desai, Ellie Napier and Minori Shimoji.





On 7<sup>th</sup> April, two Y8 teams from Fulford School competed in the York heat of the Institution of Engineering & Technology Faraday Challenge, a STEM competition for year 8 students run across the country. One of our teams (pictured) won their heat and achieved such an exceptional score they qualified for the national finals held at the end of June in Alder Hey Children's Hospital. Only the top 5 teams across the country, out of over 150 entrants, qualify for this prestigious final where they will face one final challenge with the opportunity to win £1000 for the school and recognition as national champions. A huge well done to the students for their outstanding achievement in this competition and many thanks to Mr and Mrs Allsop for facilitating this opportunity. We're looking forward to next year's effort!

We are having a really successful summer term in PE so far and we continue to have great attendance to our lunch time and after school clubs. We have also been super busy with fixtures in our summer sports (cricket, tennis and rounders) and still have lots of exciting fixtures to look forward to.

### **Rounders**

### **Cricket**

The Year 7 team played their first game in the

North Yorkshire County Cup against Rossett School, batting first and achieved a large total, then defended it comfortably to take the win. In their second game, it was a friendly against Bootham. Batting first in a 100 ball game, they achieved a modest total with George FR good contribution. Team performance in second half with good fielding and bowling from all to win again.

In their third game (North Yorkshire County Cup) against Ripon Grammar School, we were bowling first this time and reduced Ripon to a net total of 37 with some wonderful catching and run outs. The second half made life more difficult with a tough start, however showing resilience and commitment, we went on to win in the end by 15 runs progressing to the semi-finals.

The Year 8 cricket team played their first game for the school away at Bootham School. In perfect cricket conditions Bootham won the toss and batted first in a 100 ball game. Tight bowling early on from Elliot MS and Alex W was backed up by some good fielding and a fantastic effort from El-



sie B behind the stumps. The star moment of the first innings came with a direct hit run out from the covers by Elliot MS, a superb pick up and throw got the team their first wicket. Bootham achieved a competitive total with Fulford showing good depth in their bowling attack using 7 different bowlers. The second half saw an impressively resilient team performance with the bat. Captain Alex W batting through to retirement to anchor the innings with valuable contributions from Elliot MS, Josh H and Louie P. Unfortunately we came up short in the run chase but a performance to be proud of in their first school game and first ever cricket game for some of the team. A second game came against strong opponents in Archbishop Holgate's, with Fulford again bowling first. Archie's strong batting line up coupled with small boundaries meant a higher score conceded but the teamwork and resilient attitude shown by the team throughout the game was fantastic to see. A highlight being Elsie B clean bowling an opposing batsman in her first over for the school team.



The second innings saw us have to deal with quicker bowling than the first game but the defensive skills shown with the bat were impressive. We didn't manage to keep up with the required run rate but there were again some positive contributions with the bat from Eddie E and Jack R in their school debuts.

The Year 9 team played their first game in the North Yorkshire County Cup against Thirsk. Fulford were bowling first and managed to bowl Thirsk out for a small total and knocking the runs off very easily by Alfie Hodson and Olly Dodson. A great first game! In their second game against Queen Ethelburga's in the next round of the cup we were batting first. We struggled at the start but guided to a modest total with some good batting from Toby Look. Unfortunately we were beaten by a much better team with QE's opening batsmen scoring 50 (more than half the runs) to win. Y9 put up a good fight with the ball and were just beaten by the better team on the day.

Year 9 girls' cricket team played their first game against Ripon Grammar School and scored 120 runs, with the loss of only 3 wickets in a 16 over game. We then limited Ripon to 80 runs for 6 in their 16 overs securing our win. Emma Nurse was our top scorer with the bat in addition to taking the most wickets. Ellie Hayden and Emily Block were stand out performers on their cricket debuts. The Year 10 team played Bootham and secured a comfortable win. Ben Symingtn led the team in both runs scored and wickets in exceptional captain's performance. Alfie Hodson and Toby Look were also outstanding in their performance.

### **Tennis**

Our tennis teams have had lots of success this summer. Both boys and girls teams have had notable wins against a variety of local schools. Our U15 boys team made up of Seb, Alex, Dan & Caleb had a fantastic win against Ampleforth College, they really held their nerve in the final stages to secure a win in very warm conditions! Our U13 and U15 girls had well fought wins against Queen Margaret's and Scarborough College and our U13 boys have dominated throughout all their matches, particular highlights against Bootham & Ampleforth. We have had such a lovely group of dedicated students coming along to tennis clubs after school who are improving all the time!

They have recently been to Dunnington Cricket Club to lead a cricket competition and have also done an indoor athletics tournament at Fulford School where they showed their commitment by staying at school until 6pm to help and motivate local primary school children.
