Alternative Curriculum Day

Alternative Curriculum Day 20th October

The first Alternative Curriculum Day of the year took place on Thursday 20th October. These days are designed to give students a chance to spend a longer period of time studying an element of a subject to enhance their learning.



Year 7 spent the day touring various different religious buildings in and around Leeds. The various visits gave the students a real insight into the design of the building and, through the expert tour guides at each venue, a real understanding of the customs and routines followed by each religion. This links directly back to the work students complete in RE lessons.

Year 8 students spent the day working on DT, Maths and Computing projects to support the development of STEM across the school. Within DT students had the challenge of building towers and catapults out of paper. This really tested the students' design skills especially as both structures were subject to a rigorous testing process once they had been built. Within Maths, students worked in groups to use mathematical knowledge and understanding within an escape room scenario, using a series of clues to unlock padlocks. Within Computing, students worked on a range of challenges designed to support the coding skills they have covered in lessons.

Alternative Curriculum Day

Year 9 students spent half the day working on a Stock Market challenge. Here, working in small groups, they had to decide which shares to invest their money in and, as in the real world, regular news updates were designed to test students understanding of the factors that influence the price of share, buying or selling shares as a result. The other half of the day saw students working on either Art, Drama or Music activities.


Alternative Curriculum Day

The event took place in Mansion House in York which is the oldest purpose-built home for a Lord Mayor in the country. The Lord Mayor came to support the event and gave talk about the history of the building before presenting the prizes and trophies.

Fulford took a team of four Year 10 pupils to the fantastic event, and they did a wonderful job representing the school. We managed to get through to a head-to-head final round where we were narrowly beaten by Huntington School who had a team of Year 11 pupils.

The pupils each received a medal and trophy for the school from the Lord Mayor.



Remembrance Day 2022



Between Monday 7th November and Friday 11th November, Mr Rosie led Remembrance day assemblies for each year group.

Mr Rosie asked us to consider what we were remembering at this time of year and shared amazing stories with us. Below are the images of three people whose stories we heard.

Walter Tull (left) was one of English football's first black players and during WW1 he became the British Army's first ever black officer to command white troops. Walter was killed in No Man's Land at the age of 29 during the second battle of the Somme.

In March 1941, Lilian Bader (middle) became one of the first Black British women to serve in the Women's Auxiliary Air Force (WAAF). Lilian became a Leading Aircraftwoman and gained the rank of Acting Corporal.

Johnson Beharry (right) was awarded the Victoria cross in 2005 for twice risking his life to save his crew and others when in Iraq while serving as a vehicle driver, driving through enemy fire.
