COMPUTING Mr P Dring

On Wed 3rd May 2023 Kieran Wales, Jonathan Broster, Zak Morgan and Sam Hulse won an Innovation Award along with a £1,000 prize for their HydroHeat prototype that uses technology creatively to accelerate sustainable energy transition.

HydroHeat works by using renewable solar energy to power a small data centre located in a community venue such as a swimming pool, school or university. Waste energy from the data centre is then extracted and used to heat the swimming pool, potentially saving leisure centres up to £20,000 per year. The data centres themselves can be used to support local businesses, helping them make the most of cloud computing and AI technology without the data privacy concerns linked to sharing sensitive data with the big international tech companies.
