Bronze Badges

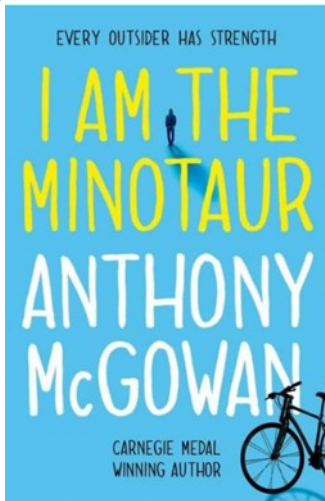
We launched a new badge initiative for Year 7 this term which has been greatly received by students.

In form time we have been reading 'I am a minotaur' by Anthony McGowan.

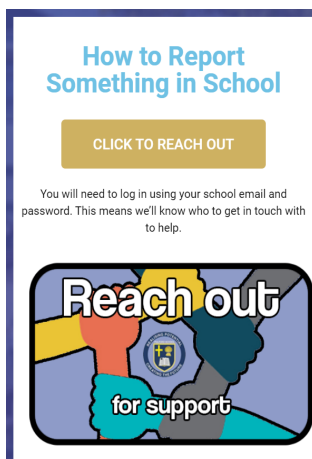
This deals with issues around bullying in schools and how the central character overcomes this. It has really helped to form discussions with students on empathy, respect and tolerance.

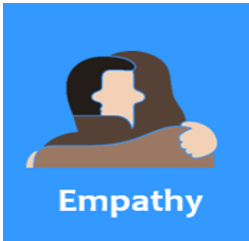
Fantastic Term

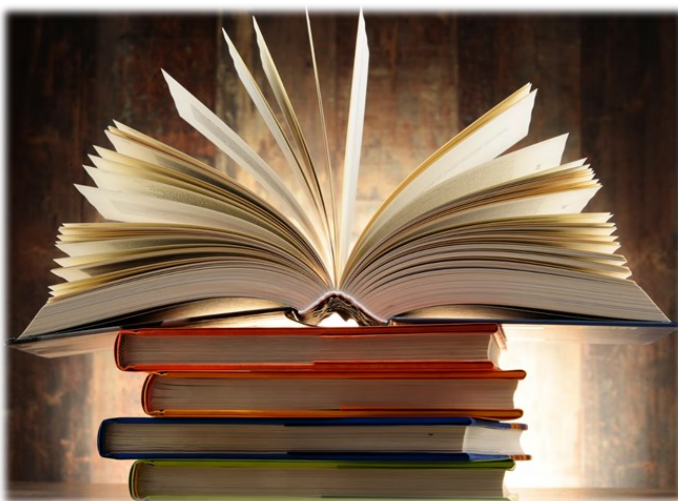
Our pledge this term is Inclusivity & Diversity so our Monday form time sessions have focused on concepts such as labelling and being open-minded to people who are different from us.

BTEC Engineering and Construction

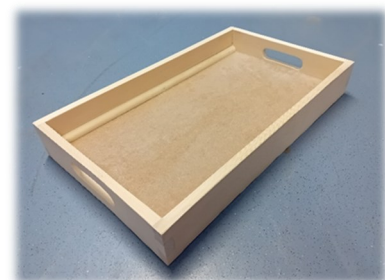
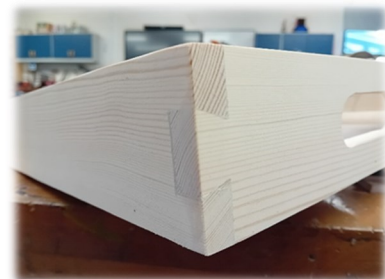
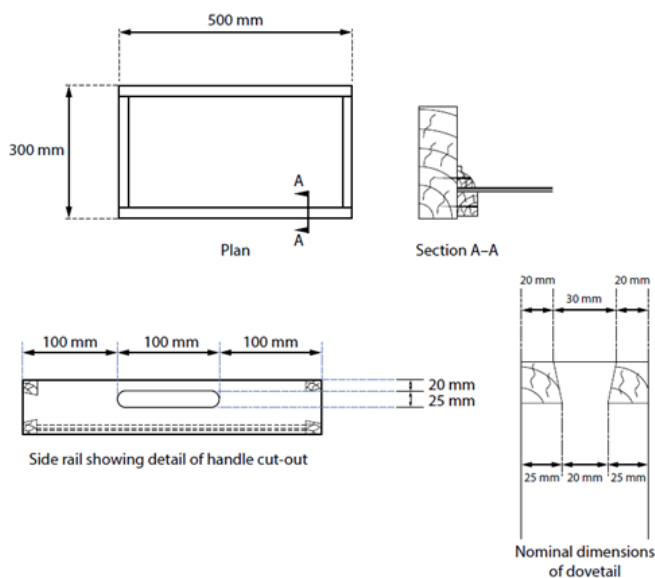
The BTEC Engineering and Construction students have completed their NEA practical assignment, which has tested their ability to read technical drawings and produce a final outcome in line with the drawings provided.

The Engineers have developed a low-cost phone rig to hold a phone steady, enabling the user to photograph small-scale objects situated on a platform.

This needed to be made to a high degree of accuracy ($\pm 3\text{mm}$) based on the drawings provided and needed to be made using a range of materials and different processes, including laser cutting, 3D printing and also traditional hand-based manufacturing skills.



The Construction students were required to make a serving tray in softwood with a plywood base with dovetailed joints. I'm particularly impressed with how accurate the students have produced these challenging joints and how much care they put into making a high-quality outcome.

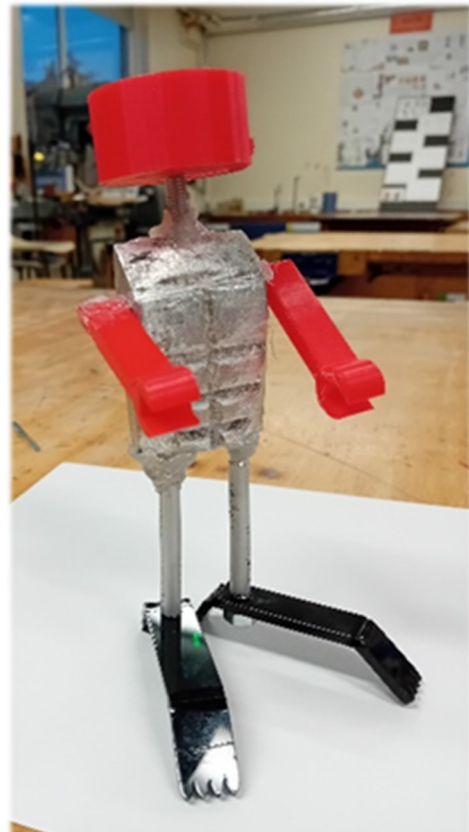
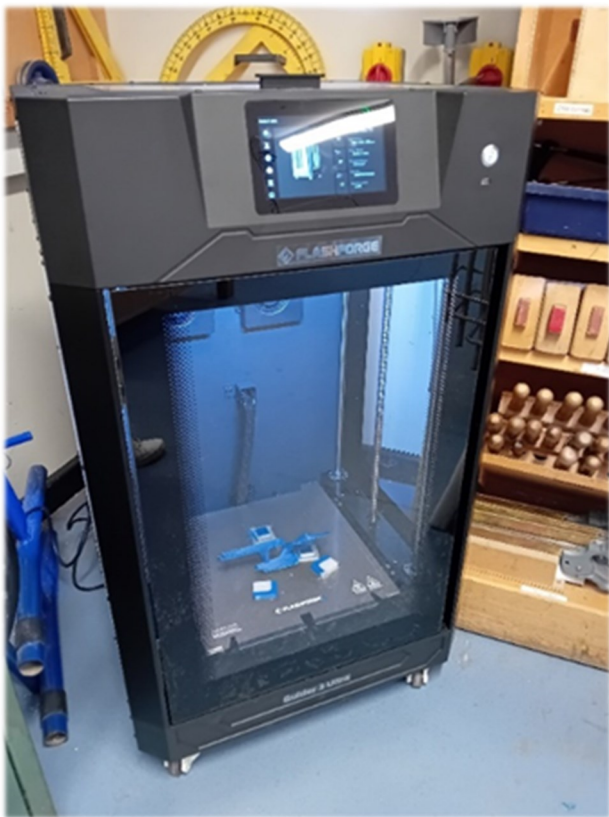

3D Printers

To help students in all areas of D&T to manufacture products using the most up-to-date technology, we have recently purchased two new 3D printers.

These printers are now being used on a daily basis for prototyping concept models and manufacturing objects which would be prohibitively difficult to create using more traditional methods.

Students have been fascinated by how these machines work and are keen to enhance their repertoire of skills by incorporating 3D printing skills into their work, such as the Year 10 students, who have been making cast aluminium B-Movie-inspired robots

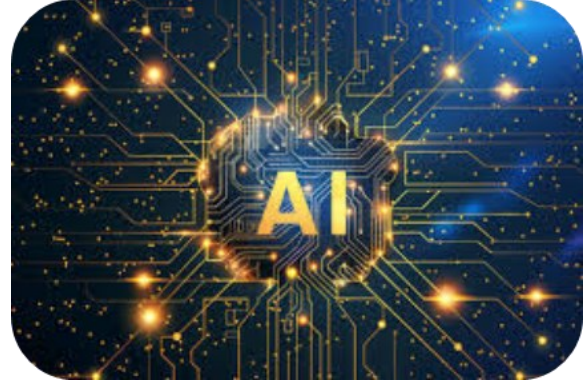


